The usual monthly meeting was held at the A.R.P. hall (old premises) on Wednesday, Oct. 26. Correspondence included a letter from the Postal Department intimating that the Association's request for a new office in the north-west portion of St. George's Rd. would be considered.

The delegates from the conference with the North Ward Progress Association reported that a resolution favoring redistribution of the municipal wards in Northcote had been carried, and that a deputation representing both organizations would submit the case to the Council meeting on November 6. Each association would have a speaker, and it was decided that Mr. F. Leo would put the point of view from the West Ward Progress Association.

Cra. Turner and Bird reported on council activities and stated that in compiling the estimates for 1944-45 it had been decided to purchase a quantity of modern road making equipment in order that at the cessation of hostilities it would be possible to embark upon a programme of road construction in an efficient and economic manner. Members unanimously supported the policy of the council in this matter, and a resolution congratulating the civic fathers on their enterprise and foresight was carried. During the discussion all speakers referred to the good condition of the majority of the roads in Northcote despite the war. It is quite evident that when things return to normal great progress can be expected.

Mr. Kelsey suggested that the association should consider the question of acquiring a block of land with a view of later erecting a hall for meetings, etc. He cited examples in other sub-

West Ward Progress Association and Clarke St. There were three items on the agenda—P.W. Citee, Cr. Hales said he had received complaints that a rubbish basket near 21 Simpson St had not been emptied regularly, and consequently attracted flies. Had a bad smell and litter covered from it—Engineer to attend.
Cr. Hales said he had been notified during high winds, that the branches of a gum tree touched electric light wires in Cain Ave, causing sparks—Referred to P.W. Citee.

Northcote St. John Ambulance Brigade thanked the Council for its co-operation over the past three years, and also for financial aid. A request was made for a similar grant next year. The balance sheet showed that receipts for the past year were £117/15/2 (including £140/8/10 proceeds of entertainments and donations). The main item of expenditure was uniforms £57/4, and total expenditure £117/17/4, leaving a balance of £9/17/10 together with £50 invested in the War Loan.—The request for continuance of grant was referred to the Committee of the Council.

Finance—Accounts paid—P.W. Citee £2,511/19/7; Parks Office £341/12/2; E.S. Citee £11,303/8/4 (including £8,000 to fixed deposit and £2,994 for bulk purchase of 1500 tons of coal at 19/8; War Damage A/c £5/11/7; Metropolitan Roads Fund £3,000 (invested in 2nd Victoria Loan); Municipal Fund—Tram A/c £5,000 (invested in 2nd Victoria Loan); General Purposes Fund £17,000 (invested in 2nd Victoria Loan) and £10,000 (placed on fixed deposit).

Sleep-out and conversion of garage to living room at 16 Bent St.—That the owner, Mrs. Dowling, be asked to pull down and remove such buildings erected contrary to Council's building by-laws and further that in the event of the owner refusing to falling to pull down and remove same, the City Engineer be directed to do so.
This recommendation of the Public Works Committee was adopted on the motion of Crs. Eshewen and Mills, there being no discussion. 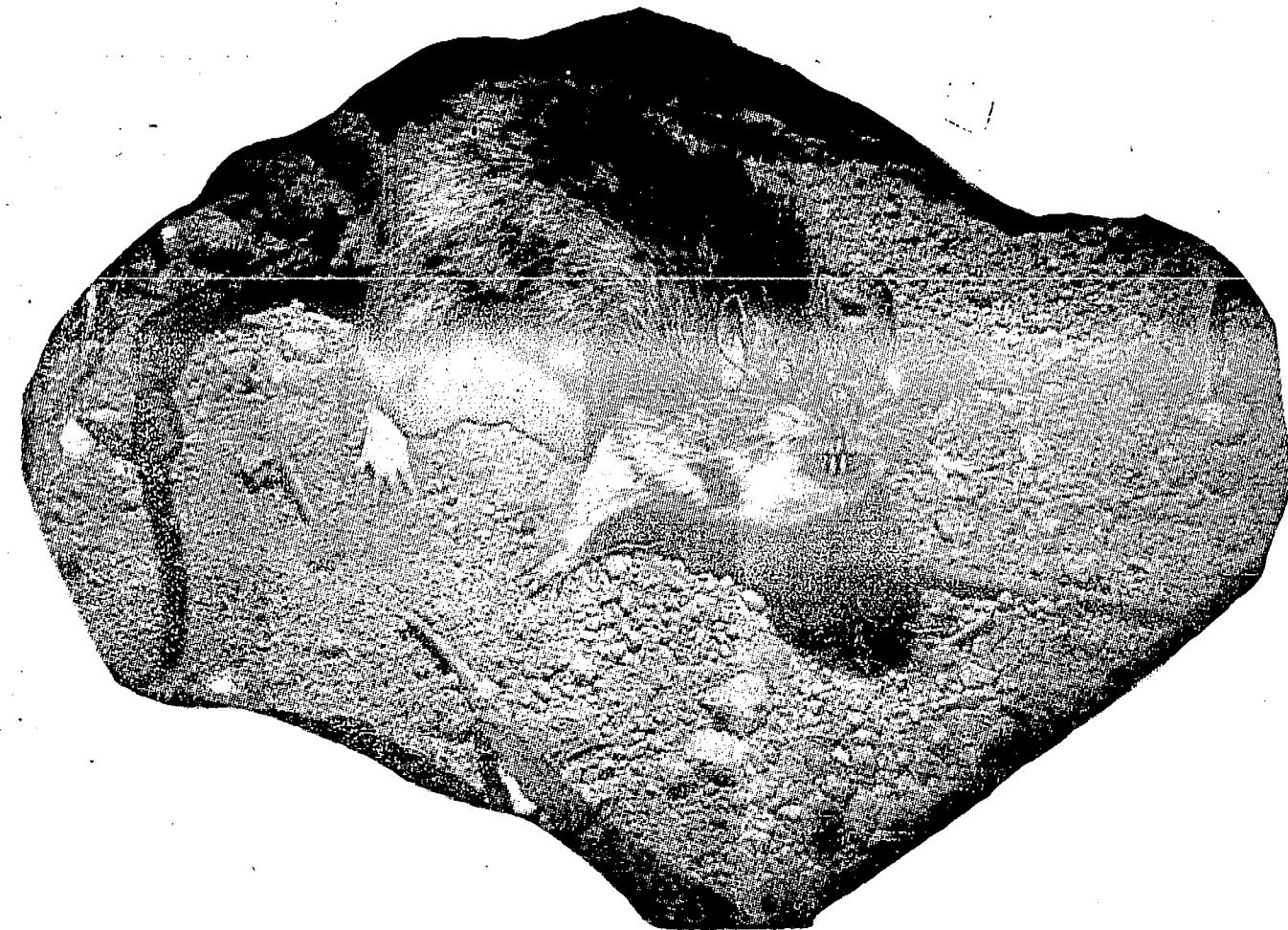
The Council has decided to make a grant of £10 to the Northcote Army Band for its instrument replacement fund, in consideration of the band giving ten recitals in public parks of the city.
General Rate—After consideration of the estimates for the coming year, the Council has found it will be necessary to strike a general rate of 2/3 in the £ (unchanged) to raise £56,753 required for the coming year.
Pan Charges will be fixed at 23/- per pan per annum in unsewered areas for the coming year.

ORDINARY BUSINESS

Cr. O'Over seconded the motion. He reported that at the Municipal Conference, while many of the metropolitan municipalities were in favor of the proposal, the weight of number of the country shires had told, and the proposal had been defeated. Cr. O'Over added that he was afraid that this defeat might preclude any chance of getting the desired amendment made by Parliament. The motion was carried.

Cr. Bird said that the Electrical Supply Department, when replacing poles, left clay and loam metal on the footpaths, according to complaints made to him. One ratepayer, who noted his nature, had complained of damage to his lawn through loose metal.
Cr. Peters said a similar complaint had been before the Electric Light Committee. Metal had been used round the new poles because the people had complained of loose clay.
In reply to a question, the City Engineer (Mr. Bradley) said that arrangements were now being made to use new poles and put on metal to the ground level, and then treat with cold bitumen to bind the metal. Later, attendants had taken place further filling would be put in. It was proposed in this way to overcome complaints of loose clay and loose metal.

GRAVITY OF PRESENT HOUSE SHORTAGE

Post War Building Schemes

All of us know that housing problems exist to-day. Some people are vague on the subject—they who are secure in the comforts of their own homes. But there is another section to whom housing shortage means tremendous discomfort. Overcrowded and unhygienic conditions are brought about by the shortage of houses, and every now and then a case or cases come before the public which points to the acuteness and tragedy of the present-day housing shortage.

A talk on "Post War Housing Problems" was given at the conclusion of the Northcote Council meeting on Monday, November 14, by Mr. Fair Thomson, secretary of the Building Trades Federation, who advanced his ideas as to how the problem of housing shortage should be tackled after the war.

There was a large attendance of visitors, and the guests were welcomed by Mrs. Turner and A. Gray.

Mr. Gray, in touching on the difficulty of finding homes, quoted a couple of cases which had come under his notice. In one, a man and his wife and four children, the youngest being six months, were housed in one room; in another case a man and wife and two children were sharing the home of a father dying with tuberculosis, and had been advised, for health reasons, to get out, but had nowhere else to go. This was a tragedy, indeed. Without adequate homes there could be no proper family life; and the home was the basis of the community.

Mr. Thomson prefaced his remarks by stating that housing was a national problem and should be handled as such, and the present position was desperate. Adequate homes were just as necessary as transport, education and other social services, and should be regarded by the Government. In the past, the erection of homes had been left in the hands of private enterprise. Going back a few years, he said the question of slums had arisen, and there were very many people who would not believe that there were any slums in this country. The people were told that there were none of the few slums, and anyhow those who lived in the slums were drunks and gamblers and did not deserve anything better.

Slum Inquiry Board was set up, and its report disclosed a disgraceful condition of affairs. The report stated that within a radius of 5 miles of the Melbourne G.P.O. 10 per cent of the houses were either unfit for human habitation or sub-standard. Many others could only be made suitable for habitation at heavy expenditure. There was a tremendous housing shortage and consequent overcrowding in the industrial areas of Melbourne, and also at Mildura, Bendigo and other provincial centres.

As a consequence, the Victorian Housing Commission had been set up, since its inception, had built 1,200 homes but this was not nearly enough. At that stage it was estimated that there was a shortage of 50,000 houses in Victoria, and plans were laid for a big-scheme building programme. The outbreak of war had upset the programme, and it was now estimated that there was a Victorian house shortage of 50,000, and the Commonwealth shortage was estimated at 275,000. These figures covered people who were in want of homes and those living in sub-standard structures. Due to the war thousands of men had been diverted to the fighting services, or construction work of military importance, or the manufacture of war materials. Nor

had it not been for rent-paying rents would have soared, but all the same there was a fair amount of rent-racketing going on, as well as overcrowding and lack of hygiene. Rooms in large houses, which were not in use, should be made available to the homeless, and this would help the position.

To build 250,000 houses was a gigantic task, and would take a great deal of planning and implementation. In addition, there were other houses falling into disrepair, and probably by the time 250,000 houses were built, a further 250,000 houses would probably be required within 10 years.

The Federal Government propose to build 50,000 houses a year until the shortage was overtaken. Such things as terms, sites where houses would be built, production of material, etc., would be a gigantic problem which would require careful consideration. His estimate of 25,000 houses a year would have to be made available every year throughout the Commonwealth to provide for the poor and indigent. The Department of the Interior had undertaken many big, big construction works, but he had no doubt it could handle this work. There would also be plenty of scope for private enterprise, some system of priorities, he felt would have to be introduced to see that the materials were not built for some people whilst others were homeless. The work of producing materials would be tremendous, but the point which would have to be

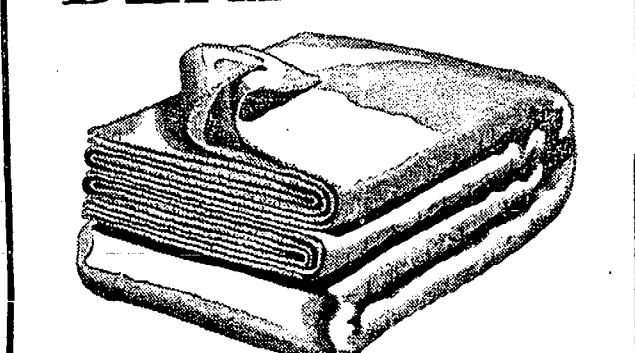

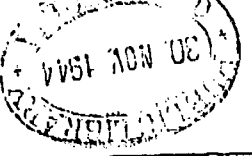

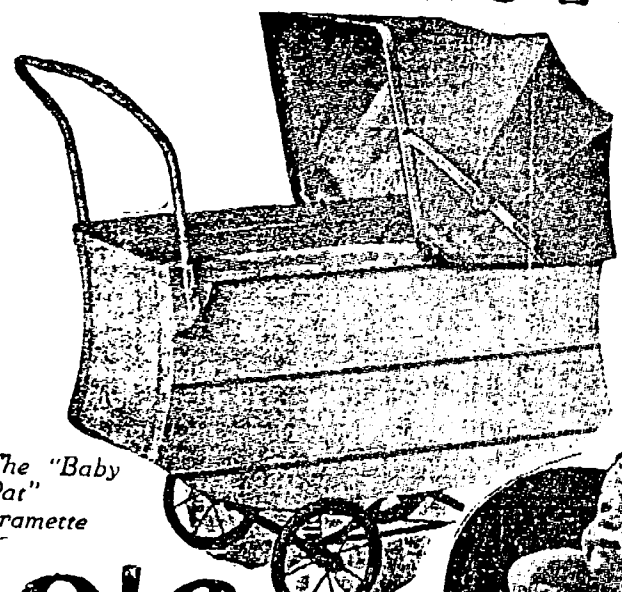

Stole Some Timber

GREENHATCHER GETS FOURTEEN DAYS

At Preston Court on November 22, Lester John Burton, 110/12 St. Collingwood, was charged with the larceny of two pieces of timber valued at 5/2, the property of Charles Jackson, Hickford St., Reservoir. Sgt. W. Connelly, prosecutor, and Messrs. J. McMahon and A. E. Newton, J.P.'s, were on the bench. Mrs. Sheila Jackson, of Hickford St., Reservoir, alleged that at about 1.30 p.m. on October 10 she heard a knock at her front door. Witness did not bother to go to the door, but through the window saw a man whom she identified as defendant. From the back of her house with two pieces of timber belonging to witness's husband. Defendant was seen to enter the wood on his cart, which was standing in front of witness's house. Witness then went out and said, "What are you doing with that wood?" Defendant replied, "Lady, I wanted to buy it." Witness said, "You were stealing it." She then took the wood from defendant. Cross-examined by defendant witness said he did not ask her the name of the wood. Const. Whyte (North Melbourne) said that at about 1.30 p.m. on October 10 he saw defendant was at his home in Dundee St., Reservoir, when he saw defendant with a horse and cart loaded with fruit and vegetables. From something witness was told, witness then went under observation. Defendant went to the home of the previous witness and came out with two pieces of wood which he put on the cart. Witness said, "What authority did you have to take these boards?" Defendant replied, "I was going to buy them." Later, at Reservoir police station, defendant said he had taken the boards to put across the cart to prevent the cases slipping forward. Defendant, who pleaded guilty, was sentenced to 14 days' imprisonment to be concurrent with another sentence he is at present serving.

STREET BETTING

At Northcote Court on November 22, before Mr. H. Pevell, P.M., and Messrs. W. J. Holden, P.M., Mercoveli and Thesz, J.S.P., James Maurice Taylor, of Bendigo St., Collingwood, was charged with street betting. Sen. Const. Arnold prosecuted. Const. Arnold told the court that at 3.40 p.m. on Nov. 4 he, in company with Const. O'Meara, was in Station St., Prairies, near the Grandview Hotel. Const. O'Meara approached defendant, who was standing outside the hotel, and witness saw defendant attempt to write on the sheet (prohibited). Witness then went up to defendant and said, "2/2. Now York, W.A." Defendant wrote down the bet. Const. O'Meara then took possession of the sheet. Witness said to defendant, "We are police. How long have you been betting here?" Defendant replied that he had been operating for a couple of weeks and that all the bets on the sheet were taken that day, and were bets on horses racing at Flemington that day. There were 85 bets to the value of £29/13/0 on the sheet. Defendant, who pleaded guilty, was convicted and fined £150 in default two months' imprisonment.

Reforming M. Board of Works

The Victorian State Cabinet has decided to adopt as a Government measure the private bill sponsored by Mr. Gartside, M.L.C., providing for the reconstitution of the Metropolitan Board, which was passed by the Legislative Council on Nov. 1. While not regarding the bill as its present form as a complete measure of reform, the Government considers it will be a useful and workable temporary measure. At present 22 metropolitan council wards are represented on the board by 33 members. Under the new formula 15 councils will lose four members but the eight municipalities not now represented will have eight members. In addition two groups of four councils each will each have a member, and thus there will be a board of 45. Of the 38 municipalities that come under the board 22 are unrepresented, and 16 are unrepresented. The objective of the bill is to bring the 38 councils within the ambit of the board on a more equitable basis of representation.
